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The Information Corner

Jun 13th – Feastday of St. Anthony of Padua.

Fernando Bulhom was born in 1195 in Lisbon, Portugal to a prominent family. Entering the religious order of St. Augustine at the age of 15, he undertook years of intense study of theology and was ordained a priest. A turning point in his life came when he learned of the martyrdom of five Franciscan friars in Morocco, at which point he joined the Franciscan order and took the name of Anthony. Although Anthony wanted to go to Morocco as well, he ended up in Italy instead due to illness and shipwreck.

Anthony's vocation as a preacher was revealed in



1222, when he was asked to give an impromptu homily at an ordination of Dominicans and Franciscans. He was assigned to

preach in northern Italy and southern France, where he made hundreds of trips and enjoyed much success against the heresies of the day. While St. Francis was in general skeptical of learned theologians within his order, he responded to the glowing reports Anthony's preaching – which was always combined with humility and poverty – by giving him permission in writing to teach the friars theology. In addition to his frequent preaching and writing, Anthony was fond of prayer in solitude, including at the famous La Verna where Francis received the stigmata.

In the last years of his life, Anthony's sermons became so famous that tens of thousands would come to hear him preach, after which he would hear confessions for many hours. Ill and exhausted, he died near Padua at age 36. Just before his death, Anthony said, "I see my Lord!" He was canonized in 1232, less than a year after his death.

St. Anthony is often portrayed in Christian art holding the child Jesus seated on an open book, based on a legend that he was once seen holding and speaking with the child Jesus. Jesus is the word of God incarnate, which St. Anthony – declared a Doctor of the Church in 1946 – was so talented at sharing through his preaching and writings.⁵

June Reflection

Often faith and learning are portrayed as in tension, almost as opposites. Catholic teaching, on the other hand, portrays these are working together within the human person, to strengthen both mind and soul. For example, it is through human reason of the observed natural world that we can discern God's existence (CCC 36). It is in this manner that St. Anthony, highlighted in this edition of the *Chimes*, put his abilities to use in furtherance of the Church.

Learning is a tool by which we further our appreciation — indeed, awe — of created universe. Without a proper balance, however, learning can take one on a path where the focus turns to oneself, rather than on the Divine. It was perhaps this concern that prompted St. Francis, when St. Anthony requested permission to teach theology, to respond:

Br. Francis sends greeting to Brother Anthony, my bishop⁶. I am pleased that you teach sacred theology to the brothers provided that, as is contained in the Rule, you "do not extinguish the Spirit of prayer and devotion" during study of this kind.⁷

With this as a guide, we can place our own study and learning within the framework of our own Rule. While we learn more about our own formation — both initial and ongoing — let us resolve to always "let prayer be the soul of what we are and do" (Rule 8).
