June 22nd – Feastday of St. Thomas More, martyr and member of the Third Order. 6

Saint Thomas More's belief that no lay ruler has jurisdiction over the Church of Christ cost him his life. Beheaded on Tower Hill, London,

on July 6, 1535, More had steadfastly refused to approve King Henry VIII's divorce and remarriage and establishment of the Church of England.

Described as "a man for all seasons," More was a literary scholar, eminent lawyer, gentleman, father of four children, and chancellor of England. An intensely spiritual man, he would not support the king's divorce from Catherine of Aragon in order to marry Anne Boleyn. Nor would he acknowledge Henry as supreme head of the Church in England, breaking with Rome, and denying the pope as head.

More was committed to the Tower of London to await trial for treason: not swearing to the Act of Succession and the Oath of Supremacy. Upon conviction, More declared he had all the councils of Christendom and not just the council of one realm to support him in the decision of his conscience. He was beheaded and died a martyr's death.

Four hundred years later in 1935, Thomas More was canonized a saint of God. Few saints are more relevant to our time. In the year 2000, in fact, Pope John Paul II named him patron of political leaders. The supreme diplomat and counselor, he did not compromise his own moral values in order to please the king, knowing that true allegiance to authority is not blind acceptance of everything that authority wants.

Bear in mind that God does not call the qualified; He qualifies the called.



June Reflection

Work is many things: a gift, a duty, a calling, a vocation, even a ministry. Our Rule states, "Let them esteem work both as a gift and a sharing in the creation, redemption and service of the human family."⁷ The Catechism states we are "called to



prolong the work of creation by subduing the earth, both *with and for one another*. Hence work is a duty....⁸" [italics added] By it we support ourselves and our loved ones. Scripture has it, "If anyone will not work, let him not eat.⁹"

If we are fortunate, what we do for our livelihood can also complement what we feel we are called to do in life – our vocation.

Work is less often considered a ministry, yet it is one. When our labors, whether paid or as a volunteer, help another human, this is a ministry. In whatever work we find ourselves called to do, and wherever we find ourselves on life's road, there is some aspect of our work where we can learn to serve others, if not directly at our job, then by applying the talents we were given and the skills we learn in other areas of life so we can serve one another. This includes both volunteer and paid work.

When we do such work, consciously and deliberately, for others' sake as well as our own, we elevate it and give it a purpose beyond ourselves. "The lives of the faithful, their praise, sufferings, prayer, and work, are united with those of Christ and with his total offering, and so acquire a new value. Christ's sacrifice present on the altar makes it possible for all generations of Christians to be united with his offering.¹⁰" After all, to be united with Christ is what we are called to be as Secular Franciscans.
