June Reflection

Happy Fathers' Day! Happy Feast of St. Anthony! Happy Month of the Sacred Heart! These three joys all occur in June, but what else could they have in common?

Firstly, let's think for a minute about fatherhood. St. Paul, rejoicing at the work of God in the Church of Ephesus, wrote, "For this reason I kneel before



the Father, from whom every family in heaven and on earth is named..." (*Eph.3:14&15*). It is from God Himself that fatherhood comes, as a reflection of His own nature, engendering life from love.

Secondly, a word about St. Anthony of Padua, whose feast we celebrate this month. He comes into our reflection on fatherhood by virtue of his holy priesthood. Fatherhood is not confined to the joyful, inexpressible beauty of its biological reality, but goes far beyond it, into a deep, ineffable spiritual reality of which the

engendering of children is a lovely icon. Those devoted men whom we call "Father," who absolve our sins, and whose hands, anointed by the successors of the



Apostles, baptize, bless, and give us the Holy Eucharist, are indeed our fathers because they engender life in our souls and bring us to birth in God's Kingdom. (One response to the world's question of why the Church doesn't ordain women to the priesthood is simply that She can't; the spiritual fatherhood of the priest is every bit as bound to gender as is the simple fact that fathers are men, not women.)

Thirdly, the Sacred Heart of Jesus reveals the Father's Heart. My dear brothers, as God makes you a man, He calls you to fatherhood. Whether married or not, a dad or not, He calls you. Scripture tells us



that the Lord desires to draw the hearts of the fathers toward the children (*Malachi 4:3*). In the Heart of Jesus we see the Heart of the Father perfectly, one with the Son, the "burning furnace of Charity" and "abyss of all Virtue" referred to in this month's Litany. United to Christ, your task becomes clear: to open your heart to provide for, protect, and lead those souls God gives you into union with God the Father through Jesus Christ. The joy and responsibility are great, and real, and fraught with eternal consequence.

Now back to St. Anthony. That lovely story of his being observed in ecstatic prayer holding the Holy Child in his arms is an image of a heavenly reality. In Christ, every soul is an icon of Jesus the Incarnate Word because He "became flesh and



dwelt among us" (*John 1:14*). And you, in the manly vocation of fatherhood, are called to embrace in charity and carry in prayer those souls you encounter with the love and devotion you would show to the Infant Christ.

Happy June, dear brothers and fathers! May you be joyful and fruitful in your vocation, may you bear the Love of Christ in your fidelity, and may the Sacred Heart of Jesus be your refuge and your strength.
