Please remember my prayers for your community.



#### **The Information Corner**

#### **Just War Doctrine**

With respect to the crisis in Syria, the Church, in its Catechism<sup>3</sup>, teaches that we are to promote peace (CCC 2302-2306) and are "obliged to avoid war" (CCC 2308, also 2307-2317). Our Rule instructs us to be "bearers of peace" (Article



19). The Church recognizes that there are circumstances under which war may be waged – for defensive purposes when attempts at peace have failed (CCC 2308). The Church lays out explicit criteria for *legitimate defense* by military force, also called the **Just War Doctrine** (CCC 2309).

Even if those to whom we witness do not accept Catholic teaching, these criteria can be expressed as ethical principles and can be used as a starting point for sincerely thoughtful dialogue with others about such a difficult issue. Reproduced below is paragraph 2309 in its entirety. See also 2243 and 1897.

<u>2309</u> The strict conditions for *legitimate* defense by military force require rigorous consideration. The gravity of such a decision makes it subject to rigorous conditions of moral legitimacy. At one and the same time:

- the damage inflicted by the aggressor on the nation or community of nations must be lasting, grave, and certain;
- all other means of putting an end to it must have been shown to be impractical or ineffective;
- there must be serious prospects of success;
- the use of arms must not produce evils and disorders graver than the evil to be eliminated. The power of modem means of destruction weighs very heavily in evaluating this condition.

These are the traditional elements enumerated in what is called the "just war" doctrine.

The evaluation of these conditions for moral legitimacy belongs to the prudential judgment of those who have responsibility for the common good.

## **September Reflection**

#### **To Live in Peace**

In chapter 14 of St. John's Gospel, Jesus gives us His gift of peace, first speaking of it as a bequest, a possession given as part of an inheritance, then as a *gift*, something freely given out of love. But he goes on to say that

His peace is not the peace the world gives, which is simply an absence of conflict (although in our world that is devoutly to be prayed for) or a casual greeting, but a supernatural gift of God. He makes this

bequest, this gift, immediately after ▶ He instructs his apostles to await the coming of the Holy Spirit. Waiting expectantly, fully prepared for God to manifest His will, is part of living in peace, not taking for ourselves what we think we ought to have, but waiting for instruction and empowerment from above. It is in that expectant faith in God's ability and willingness to give us every good and perfect gift that are to live. It is the one way to win that conflict within ourselves between the what St. Paul identifies as the flesh Beautifully articulating this and the Spirit. universal struggle, the Patriarch of the Greek Orthodox Church once wrote:



I have waged this war against myself for many years. It was terrible, but now I am disarmed. I am no longer frightened of anything because love

banishes fear.

I am disarmed of the need to be right And to justify myself by disqualifying others. I am no longer on the defensive holding onto my riches.

I just want to welcome and to share.
I don't hold onto my ideas and projects.
If someone shows me something betterNo, I shouldn't say better, but goodI accept them without any regrets
I no longer seek to compare.
What is good, true, and real is always for

What is good, true, and real is always for me the best.

That is why I have no fear.

When we are disarmed and dispossessed of self, if we open our hearts to the God man who makes all things new then He takes away past hurts

And reveals a new time where everything is possible.
