November Reflection



The Saints of God are worth celebrating. In

our time, we are blessed to have saints who lived among us and were seen daily – usually on the news, but seen nonetheless – like Saint Theresa of Calcutta, and the soon-to-be-canonized Blessed



John Paul the Great and John XXIII. We have



great reason to rejoice in the recognition that those lives were lived heroically for Christ, and in the midst of our celebration it is good to remember that these giants in the Faith were ordinary

people like us who made a series of choices for Christ. They were faithful in the little things, and the Lord entrusted them with greater.

Our brothers and sister who this month make the promises of the Evangelical Counsels and join themselves to the Franciscan family are a beautiful living witness of that grace among us. They are ordinary people, just like the rest of us, who choose to follow Christ, and have embraced this vocation desiring nothing more than to know, love and serve God, and to love their neighbors as themselves. St. Francis taught us how to live the call to holiness in the grace of simplicity, with childlike reliance upon God's providence in all things – especially in living out the vocation to sainthood. I am reminded of a poem, later a song, written in the 1800s by a mother who wished to teach her children about sanctity:

I sing a song of the saints of God, patient and brave and true,

who toiled and fought and lived and died for the Lord they loved and knew.

And one was a doctor, and one was a queen,

and one was a shepherdess on the green;

they were all of them saints of God, and I mean,

God helping, to be one too.

They loved their Lord so dear, so dear, and his love made them strong;

and they followed the right for Jesus' sake

the whole of their good lives long.

And one was a soldier, and one was a priest,

and one was slain by a fierce wild beast; and there's not any reason, no, not the least,

why I shouldn't be one too.

They lived not only in ages past;

there are hundreds of thousands still.

The world is bright with the joyous saints

who love to do Jesus' will.


You can meet them in school, or in lanes or at sea,
