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ADMONITION OF ST. FRANCIS

21. On the inane and loquacious religious ¹

Blessed (is) the servant, who when he speaks, does not reveal all his own (thoughts) in view of (some) reward, and is not swift to speak (cf. Prov 29:20), but wisely weighs what he ought to speak and answer. Woe to him religious, who does not retain in his heart (Lk 2:19.51) the good things, which the Lord shows him, and does not show them to others through work, but who in view of (some) gain desires rather to show them to men with words. He himself receives "his wage" (cf. Mt 6:2; 6:16) and (his) hearers bring back little fruit.



The Rule

Chapter One, Article 3 of The Rule of the Secular Franciscan Order.

The present rule, succeeding Memoriale Propositi (1221) and the rules by the Supreme Pontiffs approved Nicholas IV and Leo XIII, adapts the Secular Franciscan Order to the needs and expectations of the Holy Church in the conditions of changing times. lts interpretation belongs to the Holy See and its application will be made by the General Constitutions and particular statutes.

December Reflection

For the first time in 33 years, my husband and I are not going to have Christmas at home. We are "bringing Christmas" to our daughter and son-in-law in Philadelphia who are expecting their first child (a boy) right around that time. Travel and the expectation of a baby have made me ponder the Magi's journey, and how it relates to our lives. Al and I will be travelling at greater speed and with far more ease than they did, and we will bring the dinner fixings and very ordinary presents, no gold, frankincense or myrrh. The Magi knew that the one they sought was of infinite significance; we go because Jesus is of infinite significance in our lives and (thank God) in the lives of our children. We know that the Lord will be there with us in that little apartment because we will gather in His Name, but even better, when we go to Mass together at Christmas, whether in the little parish church in that Philadelphia neighborhood or anywhere in the world, we will find the Incarnate Word among us; His image in the crèche to remind us of His humble birth, His holy presence, body, blood soul and divinity in the Holy Eucharist to feed us. We are invited to an intimate communion with Him that the travelling wise men could never have imagined.

It can be easy in this world to be disappointed in Christmas; we are encouraged by those who are selling something at his time of year to desire sentimentally the perfect gift, the perfect family, the perfect life. We who seek Christ as



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our highest good know better. Jesus' first coming was in obscurity and quiet. Even though the heavens declared it, the signs were missed by most people; there was no fanfare, no noise. The Magi looked for the Messiah in an unlikely place because they understood the signs. They had the courage to pursue Him through inconvenience and hardship, on roads that they did not expect. Their reward was a personal audience with the Messiah, and, I like to imagine, a quiet interview with his holy Mother and St. Joseph. They even had an angel direct their path homeward.

This Christmas, let's look for Jesus in the unexpected places. Let's avoid having the things we have always done dictate how we respond to those spontaneous invitations to grace which God is always presenting us. Let's resolve to look for Him in the everyday things, the circumstances of life, and the unexpected opportunities to serve Him in those we encounter.



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
