## 23. On humility $^1$

Blessed (is) the servant, who is found to be as humble among his own subjects, as when for example he would be among his own lords. Mt 24:45), who in all (circumstances) does not delay to punish his own offenses interiorly by means of confession and works of satisfaction.

## **February Reflection**

Holy Mother Church is a very attentive and careful Mother who teaches her children all the time. And like most good mothers, she does it almost casually, through the ordinary events of everyday life. We see this holy wisdom again and again in the Liturgical Year.

Some who remember the "old days" might recall that just as Christmas ended with the Feast of the Presentation we were encouraged by the calendar to begin interior preparation for Lent. Depending on when Easter fell in a particular year, right around the end of Christmas we found ourselves on a Sunday called "Septuagesima" (seventy days from Easter). There was a sort of poetry to that; Christmas had been a 40-Day celebration, Easter would be a 40-Day celebration; we would soon approach the 40-day fast of Lent. In the days between we might pause and reflect on what it means to live out our faith in Christ through these great cycles of Feast and Fast.

Even though our liturgical markers and labels have changed a little, we still have the gift of "Ordinary Time," between Christmas and Lent when the Word of God invites us to contemplate the way in which Jesus interacted with fallen creation: healing, dispelling demons, raising the dead.

In these few days before the start of Lent this year, let's remove ourselves interiorly from the



world a little, and come away with Jesus to a desert place. Pause to remember that He has already accomplished all for us, and that in Him we have eternal life, victory over sin and death, and through

His infinite Grace, detachment from our own desires. Let's put out into the deep of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving, trusting that Jesus will accomplish through us all those good things He has ordained for us to walk in. And be at peace because Jesus has walked the path before us.
