News From Our Seminarian

Ryan Pineda writes:

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Pax et Bonum! I'm finally back in Theological College seminary to begin my last year of theological studies. Today is actually the first day of



classes and I just finished my Eschatology class at Catholic University. This is an interesting class. We will be discussing the last things (heaven, hell and purgatory). Aside from Eschatology, I am also taking Art of Pastoral Leadership class and I am auditing a class on the Prophets of Israel. Since Christian Anthropology is not offered at the Catholic University this semester, I am taking a similar class, Creation and the Human Person, at the Dominican House of Studies. Finally, before I earn my degree, I have to take and pass my comprehensive exam. It's still 2 months away but it will be challenging to review four years of theological studies while still in formation. Please pray for me.

This is one of the difficulties of still studying even after being ordained as deacon and assisting at the Church as a deacon this summer. Although I still continue my parish ministry on weekends, it is quite a challenge to balance devoting time to studies and to ministry.

Indeed, now that I am back in the seminary, I will not be able to attend the daily Mass at the parish which I did this past summer. My summer assignment has really been helpful to me. I was able to exercise my diaconate ministry by assisting at the daily and weekend Masses. I preached on the third Sunday of the month and on Mondays and Fridays. Then, if I am not the assigned deacon, I still attend the Mass to help distribute communion and to greet the parishioners. While at St. Joseph's on Capitol Hill, I also led a communion service at the hospital/rehab/long-term care facility that is within the parish boundary.



However, my most favorite moment was the baptism that I presided. It was indeed a privilege to welcome two babies. Preparing the couples and godparents, blessing the water, discussing the rite of baptism and doing the actual baptism are things that I will never forget. I know that I will preside at other baptisms but my first baptism will always be special.

There were challenges as well but these gave an opportunity to discover how to deal with pastoral issues.

I will keep you posted on what's going on in my formation. Also, please let me know if you want me to give a talk or reflection. I would love to do that as long as my schedule allows.

Thank you again for all your support and prayers. Please remember of my prayers for your community.

There is a lot going on this month. In neighboring Philadelphia the World Meeting of Families will be graced by the presence of the Holy Father. Here in the District he will preside at a rather low-key Papal Mass (if anything to do with a pope's visit can be called low-key!) and visit to Capitol Hill and the White House.
