4. Let no one appropriate to himself superior over others ¹

I did not come "to be ministered unto, but to minister" (cf. Mt 20:28), says the Lord. November Reflection

One of the first actions our Holy Father Pope Francis took after his election was to declare a Year of Mercy, which will begin with the start of Advent this year. This remarkable declaration says much about the Pope's heart for the lost, and manifests his prophetic role as Vicar of Christ, for it is Christ's own unfathomable love for humanity which speaks in this beautiful declaration.

What does Mercy mean, though, in the context of a world that has lost all sense of sin? How do we live out and offer heavenly Mercy to those who don't believe they are in need of it? The world believes that to be merciful means to turn a blind eye to sin, to change or temporize the law of God to accommodate the fashion of the age. God's mercy is infinitely greater than that, and infinitely more costly: it is seen at the Cross of Calvary where God's perfect Justice and His infinite Mercy kiss (Ps 85:11).

Each of us is in constant, desperate need of the Divine Mercy, and we are called to be agents of mercy here on earth. As we begin the new Liturgical Year, let's acknowledge our own need for God's mercy and seek it daily. As we respond to grace, we respond with love to those around us, finding ourselves able to walk in Charity, interceding even more for those who do not know Christ. And as we live in the mercy of God, those who see us may see and, we pray, long for the great hope in which we live.
