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The Rule

Chapter Two, Article 26 of The Rule of the Secular Franciscan Order.

As concrete sign а of communion and coresponsibility, the councils on various levels, in keeping with the constitutions, shall ask for suitable and well-prepared religious spiritual for assistance. They should make this request to the superiors of the four religious Franciscan families, to whom the Secular Fraternity has been united for centuries.

To promote fidelity to the charism as well as observance of the rule and to receive greater support in the life of the fraternity, the minister or president, with the consent of the council, should take care to ask for a regular pastoral visit by the competent religious superiors as well as for a fraternal visit from those of the higher fraternities, according to the norm of the constitutions.

November Reflection

It is impressive, the unity to which we are called by our profession: unity with the Church, unity with one another, unity with our brothers and sisters off all faiths throughout the world. After my experience last weekend, I would like to add another to this list: unity within the Order. In contrast with the horizontal unity that is often considered, this is a vertical unity of the different parts of our Order, working as an organic whole.

To give context: Last weekend, November 12, the St. Margaret of Cortona held its annual meeting, or Chapter, in Crofton, MD, where I was privileged to represent our fraternity. Here I observed unity within the Order in action. Just as our fraternity recently had its triannual fraternal visitation by a representative from the Region, every third year the Region has a visitation by the National fraternity, NAFRA. This was such a year. Attending, one could see three levels in action – local Ministers, Regional Council, and National representatives, both OFS laity and friars – working in concert with one another, to promote furtherance of the Franciscan message and charism.

The National Visitors – a TOR friar and a National Council member – were present to observe, listen to, and report on our Region. Their oral report was glowing: The Region is "fantastic," its Council is "young" (all but 2 are newly elected on the Regional Council) and "great," and we have a "wonderful" formation team. Many ideas were suggested on how the Region can improve, too many to list here, which our Regional Executive Council will surely discuss in the months to come and report on to local ministers.

As with local fraternity meetings, this gathering was organized around prayer, social time, and – only as much as is necessary – business. The National Visitors, in three separate spiritual addresses, spoke of our mission, asking us to reach out, build bridges, walk in the others' shoes, put on the armor of Christ, listen, and pray. There was also a short reflection on the Visitation to Mary and some of her many attributes.

For the social aspect, during and after lunch fraternity representatives discussed in small groups their strengths, challenges, how to address them, how the Regional Fraternity could help, and how they could help the Region. After lunch the groups shared these with the entire chapter.

In matters of business, the Chapter adopted a budget; discussed upcoming workshops and meetings; set the Fair Share amount; endorsed the concept of future chapters being held for an entire weekend to permit fuller participation by all; reviewed initial and ongoing formation materials; moved to standardize various forms that are used; and improved communication through the purchase of bilingual equipment (we have two Spanish, two Korean, and one deaf fraternity, so there were interpreters). Of particular mention was Franciscan Youth, which is a way to expose youth – teens through young adults – to the Franciscan charism and way of life; it is not an early path to profession.

Before the closing prayer there was a remembrance ceremony, in which the names of those deceased from each fraternity since the last chapter were announced; let us remember those from our own fraternity: Rita Braddock, Charles T. P. Flachbarth, Apollonia Sergi, and Eugene Sides.

We thank you, Lord, for the gift of Your Church, whose unity with and fidelity to You strengthen us daily and enable us to be missionaries of Your Truth and Word in the world.
