<u>St. Francis Teaches</u> – *The Reverence and Zeal for God's House (the Church).* Christ's love for the Father was so intense that it burned Him up to the extent of bringing him to drive out with force those making of the temple a marketplace. The worship He rendered to God was not centered on ritual or ceremonies, but on the offering up of His own life for the ransom of many. His zeal in fulfilling his mission brought about the glory of God, the good of man, and the building up of His Church.

Between the Poverello and the Church existed the most delightful harmony. For Francis, perfect loyalty to Mother Church was in itself a rule as it was for him and his order to remain faithful to the Holy Gospel. The Prior, Burchard

of Ursperg, who knew Francis and his first companions well, reports that "The Friars Minor are submissive to the Apostolic See in all things." To believe, pray, think, work, feel and live with the Church was for Francis and his friars the most determined goal. In his First Rule, the man of God commands: "Let none of the brothers preach contrary to the form and the institution of the holy Roman Church." He also stresses, "Let all brothers be Catholic and live and speak in a Catholic manner." As a result, the singular title of "Francis the Catholic" was accorded to the Saint in his liturgical Office. His reverence and devotion for the Church manifested itself toward the clergy as well: "Let us hold all clerics and Religious as our masters in those things which regard the salvation of souls, if they do not deviate from our religion, and let us reverence their office and order and administration in the Lord."

Zeal for God's House consumed Francis. That zeal was kept alive by the love he bore for the Holy Trinity; a love which fired up his passion to a flame enabling him to be more effective and productive. Called from above to labor for the renewal of the faith, he threw himself with his household into an untiring evangelic-apostolic activity. The chosen one of God, along with his Franciscan preachers, pointed out the way of salvation to men and women everywhere. "By his word he branded all wisdom of the world as obvious folly, and by the simplicity of his preaching led all men to the true wisdom of God under the leadership of Christ." With the zeal of the Apostles, "He sowed the seed of life and brought forth manifold fruit" (Thomas of Celano). Zeal for souls has always been the "pole-star" of the Franciscan apostolate. If hesitant in where to start, ask the Lord, "What will you have me do?"

**Reflection:** In the "Our Father" which is prayed daily in church, we say: "**Thy Kingdom come, Thy Will be done on** earth as it is in Heaven". Let us believe and trust that God, in His mercy, will make this come true; that the day shall rise when mankind will join with the worshipers in the heavenly courts above, where all is purity and perfection, where every being has perfect reverence for God and His holiness. Zeal for God's House grows when we let the Holy Spirit build His Temple in us so God's love and mercy may dwell in our hearts. In order to make room for the Spirit, all unwanted intruders must be driven out, like the evils of greed, injustice, violence, fear, pride and selfishness. "Let us always make in us this tabernacle and dwelling place for Him who is the Lord God omnipotent" (St. Francis in his Admonitions). Let this be a Lenten practice before the season ends!

- 2. Towards which end do we especially pray at Mass when saying the "Our Father"?
- 3. How is true reverence for God revealed, since He has commanded nothing that is unessential?



Feast of St. Joseph, Spouse of Mary and Foster Father of Jesus -

**March 19** – St. Joseph, by divine choice, became the head of the Holy Family. His proximity to the Blessed Mother and the Incarnate Word had a unique sanctifying effect upon him. He was the only one to have known and enjoyed the company and wisdom of Jesus Christ as God and man, and of Mary as the Virgin Mother. On this special privilege are laid the foundations of the honor paid to St. Joseph who was named the patron saint of the Universal Church. "The earliest traces of public recognition of the sanctity of St. Joseph are to be found in the East. His feast, if we may trust the assertions of Papebroch, was kept by the Copts as early as the beginning of the fourth century. Nicephorus Callistus tells likewise that in the basilica erected at Bethlehem by St. Helena, there was a gorgeous oratory dedicated to the honor of our saint." (Catholic Encyclopedia)



In December 1870, Pope Pius IX solemnly declared the Holy Patriarch Joseph, patron of the Catholic Church, and enjoined that his feast (19 March) should be celebrated, but without octave, on account of Lent. Following the Footsteps of their predecessor, Leo XIII and Pius X have shown an equal desire to add their own jewel to the crown of St. Joseph: the former, by permitting on certain days the reading of the votive Office of the saint; and the latter by approving, on 18 March, 1909, a litany in honor of him whose name he had received in baptism.



**Franciscan Feast – Bl. Didacus Joseph of Cadiz (1743-1801) –** <u>March 24</u> – Didacus was born in March 29. His lineage dated from the Visigoth kings. As a youth, he received the surname of "dunce of Cadiz" since he could make no progress at school. He amazingly became the most celebrated preacher in Spain, a St. Paul of his century! He took the habit of St. Francis with the Capuchins in Seville and was ordained a priest. The Holy Spirit gave power and unction to his words because of his humility and virtuous life. One day, while preaching in church, a child seated with his mother shouted: "Mother, mother, see the dove resting on the shoulder of Father Didacus! I could preach like that too if a dove told me all that I should say!" Before his sermons, Didacus used to scourge himself even unto blood in order to draw down God's mercy more effectively upon the people. The holy Capuchin died in 1801 at the age of 58. He was beatified By Pope Leo XIII in 1894. His feast is March 24.

# March Reflection

The special jubilee year dedicated to St. Paul by Pope Benedict XVI will end soon. The Pauline year, as we know, opened on June 28, 2008, and will close on June 29, 2009. It marks the 2000<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the saint's birth. The Holy Father said that the Church needs modern Christians who will imitate the Apostle's missionary energy and spirit of sacrifice, and that Christ needs witnesses and martyrs like St. Paul.

The Pope's announcement was made while presiding over a vespers service at the Basilica of St. Paul Outside the Walls in Rome, the eve of the feasts of Sts Peter and Paul, patron saints of Rome. Beneath the basilica's main altar, Vatican experts have excavated and found a marble sarcophagus which is indeed the tomb of St. Paul who was believed martyred nearby. The sarcophagus, "according to the common opinion of the experts and unopposed tradition, holds the remains of the apostle Paul." The Pope recalled that St. Paul lived, worked and died for Christ. He also noted that, according to a long-standing tradition, St. Peter and St. Paul met near the basilica before they were martyred, and they hugged and blessed each other. They were united in the spirit of love and peace of Christ.

There were several publications on the writings of St. Paul offered during this commemorative year. His letters are a primary source of information about the life of the early church, which have strongly influenced its thinking through the centuries. St. Paul's apostolic activity should inspire us who are called to fulfill the same mission: to bring about the Kingdom of God and the salvation of souls.
