Words of Admonition of Our Holy Father Francis - On Faith in the Lord's Body.

"It is really the Spirit of God who dwells in his faithful who receive the most holy Body and Blood of our Lord. Anyone who does not have this Spirit and presumes to receive him eats and drinks judgement to himself (1 Cor. 11:29). And so we may ask in the words of Scripture, Men of rank, how long will you be dull of heart? (Ps. 4:3). Why do you refuse to recognize the truth and believe in the Son of God? (Jn 9:35) Every day he humbles himself just as he did when he came from his heavenly throne (Wis. 18:15) into the Virgin's womb; every day he comes to us and lets us see him in abjection, when he descends from the bosom of the Father into the hands of the priest at the altar. He shows himself to us in this sacred bread just as he once appeared to his apostles in real flesh. With their own eyes they saw only his flesh, but they believed that he was God, because they contemplated him with the eyes of the spirit. We, too, with our own eyes, see only



bread and wine, but we must see further and firmly believe that this is his most holy Body and Blood, living and true. In this way our Lord remains continually with his followers, as he promised, *Behold*, *I am with you all days*, *even unto the consummation of the world* (Mt. 28:20). (From the Writings of St. Francis – The Admonitions)

Catechism of the Catholic Church - On the True Presence of Christ in the Eucharist.

The Eucharistic presence of Christ begins at the moment of the consecration and endures as long as the Eucharistic species subsist. Christ is present whole and entire in each of the species and whole and entire in each of the parts, in such a way that the breaking of the bread does not divide Christ (Council of Trent).

Worship of the Ehcharist – In the liturgy of the Mass we express our faith in the real presence of Christ under the species of bread and wine by, among other ways, genuflecting or bowing deeply as a sign of adoration of the Lord. "The Catholic Church has always offered and still offers to the sacrament of the Eucharist the cult of adoration, not only during Mass, but also outside of it, reserving the consecrated hosts with the utmost care, exposing them to the solemn veneration of the faithful, and carrying them in procession" (Paul VI, MF 56, CCC 1378). "The Church and the world have a great need for the Eucharistic worship. Jesus awaits us in this sacrament of love. Let us not refuse the time to go to meet him in adoration, in contemplation full of faith, and open to making amends for the serious offenses and crimes of the world. Let our adoration never cease" (John Paul II, Dominicae cenae, 3, CCC 1380).

Questions for Discussion – Faith in the Presence and True Worship of the Eucharist.

- 1 After receiving Jesus in Holy Communion, our thoughts should normally be focused on Him only. Are we fascinated by Him? How should we behave after Communion?
- When we receive the Eucharist, the bonds of charity between us and Christ are strengthened each time. What benefit does the Church draw from it?
- 3 Why is the Eucharist offered as sacrifice at the altar?

The Rule – Chapter Two, Article 19 of The Rule of the Secular Franciscan Order.



Secular Franciscan, therefore, should seek to encounter the living and active person of Christ in their brothers and sisters, in Sacred Scripture, in the church, and in liturgical activity. The faith of Saint Francis, who often said "I see nothing bodily of the Most High Son of God in this world except his most holy body and blood," should be the inspiration and pattern of their Eucharistic life.

Lent Schedule at the Franciscan Monastery

<u>Holy Thursday – April 9:</u> 7:00pm - The Lord's Supper, Procession followed by Adoration until midnight. <u>Good Friday – April 10:</u> 3:00pm - Stations of the Cross. 3:30pm - Liturgy. 8:00pm - Burial of Christ.



On Good Friday, April 10, we shall stand at the foot of the cross beside our Blessed Mother, St. John and St. Mary Magdalen, so we may witness and mourn with them. Let us look with trust and hope at the pierced side of Jesus from which flows "blood and water", the fountain which heals the wounds of our sins. Contemplating Christ crucified, all beaten for our salvation, moves us to open our hearts to our suffering and wounded neighbor. It is at the foot of the cross that Mary became our Mother. She is our model in the imitation of her Son. We cannot presume to persevere in bearing our crosses, counting on our own strength. With her, at our side, we learn from her immeasurable love for the Lord, her courage and serenity that surpass our own. There is no more fear, no hesitation when she leads. If we are overwhelmed by an ordeal, let us look to Jesus, let us look to Mary. Let us also contemplate Christ crucified in the Holy Mass where the sacrifice of the cross is repeated daily. Let us gather around the altar on which a new Calvary is brought into place.

Our Savior and King gave us new life by His Death and Resurrection. Glory and praise to the risen Christ! It is on Easter morning that the Cross of our Lord, the tree of suffering and sacrifices, truly becomes the **Tree of Life**.

Let us offer our prayers and sacrifices for our Holy Father who carries the cross of his pontificate. Like Christ, he so often faces oppositions. May God assist and protect him!

Franciscan Feast - Bl. Giles of Assisi, 1st Order (1190-1262) - April 23 - Giles, one of the first followers of St. Francis, was a simple and prayerful man. Francis held Giles in high esteem, and because of his purity of heart and single-mindedness he used to call him "our Knight of the Round Table." In 1209, when Francis set out for Rome to request from Pope Innocent III the approval of his Rule, Giles was one of his companions on the journey. He spent most of his life at various Franciscan houses in Italy engaged in contemplation and manual labor.

Often in ecstasy, he won popular acclaim as a saint, and people high and low came to seek his advice. Pope Gregory IX and St. Bonaventure, who venerated him, paid him visits in his final residence near Perugia. His collected spiritual maxims, The Golden Sayings, still remain a spiritual "best seller." Giles' reputation spread even to France. One day King St. Louis IX of France, en route to the Holy Land, dropped in to see him in Umbria. Louis and Giles embraced each other, knelt for a while to pray, and then parted. During the whole visit neither had spoken a word. The monarch respected the friar's opposition to needless conversation. When St. Bonaventure came to Perugia, Giles asked him if an ignorant person could love God as much as a scholar. Bonaventure



responded, "a little old woman can love God even more than a master of theology." Giles immediately ran out, met an old woman and told her, "O poor little old woman, though you are simple and uneducated, just love the Lord God and you can be greater than Brother Bonaventure." Typically then, he went into an ecstasy that lasted three hours.

April Reflection

The Church will celebrate the glorious feast of *Easter* on *Sunday 12 April. Holy Thursday* will take us first at the Last Supper, in the company of the disciples, when Jesus shares His Holy Body and Blood with his friends under the species of bread and wine, our Eucharistic food. Later, on *Good Friday*, we shall be ready to look ahead and rise up with Jesus Christ on Easter Day. The fact that Jesus rose from the tomb demonstrated that He has power over death, and only through Him can humanity have hope for eternal life. The fulfillment of the establishment of God's Kingdom in this world truly began on Easter Sunday when a new creation shone forth, empowered by the Holy Spirit, the first gift of the Resurrection.

Every sin, every failure, insecurities and hurts, were nailed to the cross with Jesus. When he died, our transgressions were taken to the grave with him. On that glorious Sunday, as he rose victorious, he left behind in the tomb all that had destroyed our relationship with God. The slate has been wiped clean! Not only are we forgiven, but Christ gives us a second, a third, and a fourth chance, even as many chances as we need, until we get it all straighten up, until we resemble the resplendant Jesus of the Gospel.
