## St. Francis and the Catechism of the Catholic Church On the Love of God and Obedience to His Commandments

Francis' love for God was mostly directed toward Christ, the God-Man. Since the Father and the Holy Spirit are with the Son, One, and the same God, Francis' deep affection for Jesus was automatically intended for the other two Persons of the Trinity. Francis, by nature, was a passionate lover. "From the time of his conversion to his death, he loved Christ with his whole heart, bearing the memory of Him constantly in his mind. So ardently and tenderly did he love the divine Savior, that, on hearing His sweet Name, he became enraptured and exclaimed: "Heaven and earth should bow before the Name of the Lord" (The Three Companions). In his prayers, he besought the Savior to grant him the grace of perfect love. His entire life was one long prayer of love to God. "Love and honor the Lord God with a clean heart and a pure mind" was his constant admonition to the brothers. "Intoxicated with divine love" would be the characteristic trait of the saint, as declared the Three Companions. St. Bonaventure reported: "Like a glowing coal he appeared to be wholly consumed by the flame of divine love."



His Obedience — In the name of the sovereign Trinity, Francis adjured the Chapter General in a letter: "Listen, children of the Lord and my brothers, and with your ears take up my words. Turn the ear of your heart to the voice of the Son of God and obey it. With all your heart keep his commandments, and fulfill his counsels with a perfect will. Proclaim it that he is good, and in what you do, glorify him (Tob. 6,8), because he has sent you all over the world so that you should bear witness to his voice in word and deed, and have everybody learn that there is no one almighty but he. Persevere under holy discipline and obedience, and with a good and firm resolution comply with what you have promised him. For God our Lord deals with you as with his children (Heb. 12, 7).

The Catechism of the Catholic Church, on Our duty to Love and Obey the Lord God: "You Shall Love the Lord Your God With All Your Heart, And With All Your Soul, And With All Your Mind" God has loved us first. The love of the One God is recalled in the first of the "ten words". The commandments then make explicit the response of love that man is called to give to his God (2083). "The first commandment embraces faith, hope, and charity. When we say 'God' we confess a constant, unchangeable being, always the same, faithful and just, without any evil. It follows that we must necessarily accept his words and have complete faith in him and acknowledge his authority. He is almighty, merciful, and infinitely beneficent. Who could not place all hope in him? Who could not love him when contemplating the treasures of goodness and love he has poured out on us? Hence the formula God employs in the Scripture at the beginning and end of his commandments: I am the Lord "(2086, Roman Catechism 3, 2, 4). Our moral life has its source in faith in God who reveals his love to us. St. Paul speaks of of the "obedience of faith" as our first obligation. He shows that "ignorance of God" is the principle and explanation of all moral deviations. Our duty toward God is to believe in him and to bear witness to him (2087). The first commandment requires us to nourish and protect our faith with prudence and vigilance and to reject everything that is opposed to it (2088).

### <u>Questions (to cover on your own)</u> – On Love of God and Obedience to His Commandments.

- 1. What governs our choices when confronted by God's Commandments?
- 2. In which circumstances in his life has St. Francis manifested his love and obedience to God?
- 3. The Virgin Mary lived the surrender of love with perfection. What made her so receptive?



### The Rule - Chapter Two, Article 9 of The Rule of the Secular Franciscan Order

The Virgin Mary, humble servant of the Lord, was open to his every word and call. She was embraced by Francis with indescribable love and declared the protectress and advocate of his family. The Secular Franciscans should express their ardent love for her by imitating her complete self-giving and by praying earnestly and confidently.

Feast of the Month – Our Lady of Fatima – May 13 – Pope John Paul II said at Fatima: "The message of Fatima is more relevant and more urgent than when Our Lady first appeared on May 13, 1917." The message of Fatima is an anguished appeal of our Heavenly Mother, who sees us in great danger and who comes to offer her help and advice. Her message is also a prophecy, a clear indication of what was about to transpire in the 20<sup>th</sup> century, and what is still going to happen infallibly in the near future, depending on our response to her requests, and our praying the Rosary often.

Our lady of Fatima continues to work miracles today through Fatima water. This water sprang up in Fatima at the spot the Bishop told people to dig, very near where our Lady appeared at the Cova de Iria (the Cove of Peace). The water is known to cure people with sicknesses and poor health. Spiritual healings can especially be obtained through Mary.



She is the fountain of supernatural health and our merciful Mother who listens to her children who love her, seek her and invoke her with confidence. *In this month of May, the month of Mary*, let us show our appreciation for having in her such a powerful intercessor. She said in Fatima, "I will never forsake you. My Immaculate Heart will be your refuge and the way that will lead you to God…"

Franciscan Feast – St. Paschal Baylon (1540-1592) – May 17 – Paschal was born on the feast of Pentecost at Torre Hermosa in Spain. His parents were poor but rich in piety and Christian virtue. The child appeared to be endowed with all the gifts of the Holy Spirit. As a boy, he had to tend the cattle of strangers. The children of his age had a certain respect for him and would listen to the Christian instructions he sometimes gave them. At the age of 24 he begged for admission as a lay brother at the convent of the Friars Minor at Monteforte. His request was granted, and Paschal seemed to run the path of perfection with ease. He was so humble that he considered himself the last of all. Out of charity, he cheerfully assumed the most burdensome duties for other brothers. Most devoted to prayer, he spent all his spare time at it. He always had his rosary in his hand and God in his heart. He fostered a special devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary, whom he called his mother, and to the Blessed Sacrament, and it proved a constant means to rekindle his zeal.



God showed how pleased He was with his devotion. One day while out-of-doors, Paschal devoutly knelt down to adore the Blessed Sacrament when the bell announced the Consecration. At that moment the Blessed Sacrament was presented to him in a monstrance supported by angels. In the convent church he was frequently found before the tabernacle prostrate or with his arms outstretched, or even rapt in ecstasy. The simple brother, who had never learned to read or write, could discourse about deepest mysteries of religion with marvelous insight to the astonishment of the most learned men. Paschal died at Villareal, on the feast of Pentecost, the feast on which he was born. At his funeral, when the Blessed Sacrament was raised in the Requiem Mass, the dead body raised itself, bowed to the Sacred Host, repeating the act of reverence at the elevation of the Chalice. Numerous other miracles occurred at his grave.

Pope Paul V beatified Paschal and Pope Alexander VIII canonized him in the year 1690. Pope Leo XIII in 1897 made him the patron of all Eucharistic societies and congresses.
