Why a retreat? What to expect from a retreat?



A retreat is an opportunity to encounter God and to grow in our relationship with Christ. We live in a noisy and distracting world. Interior silence can help open our minds and hearts to the whispers of God. In a retreat, we are called to practice spiritual discipline, blocking out the noise in order to hear that still and soft whisper which is God's voice. Only in the quiet can we hear Him. Only in the silence of our heart can he tell us the truth about ourselves and lead us in a spiritual discerning experience. The appropriate instructions accompanied with prayer, private reflections and the Eucharist, deepen our understanding of God's plan for us. Wisdom should be the fruit of any retreat well spent.

The first retreat might have started with John the Baptist who was renewed interiorly in the wilderness, in preparation for his mission as precursor of Christ. Jesus went for forty days in the desert, fasting and praying before being tested by Satan. Weakened in body, but strong in spirit, he was ready to confront the enemy. Centuries later, hermits did battle with their passions in the silence and privation of the desert. Having withdrawn from society and its pleasures, they acquired great holiness so that people sought them for their wisdom which made them spiritual leaders. May our retreat be for us a profound spiritual experience!

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The Rule – Chapter Two, Article 11 of The Rule of the Secular Franciscan Order.



Trusting in the Father, Christ chose for himself and his mother a poor and humble life, even though he valued created things attentively and lovingly. Let the Secular Franciscans seek a proper spirit of detachment from temporal goods by simplifying their own material needs. Let them be mindful that according to the gospel they are stewards of the goods received for the benefit of God's children.

Thus, in the spirit of "the Beatitudes," and as pilgrims and strangers on their way to the home of the Father," they should strive to purify their hearts from every tendency and yearning for possession and power.

St. Francis Teaches the Essential That Forms Us Into God's Image – Holiness is the key opening the gate of Heaven and the Heart of God. The soul marked with the sign of the Lamb is the "elect" who best resembles the Son of the Most High, Jesus, the perfect revelation of God's love. To be chosen is to be a faithful servant obeying the divine law inscribed deep into the conscience and who, through the impulse of the Holy Spirit, exercises true mastery over himself, being molded into a perfect leader of the people. In this fashion was St. Francis formed, bathed into the light of the Spirit, taking upon himself to practice all virtues before even starting preaching.



Francis knew that all virtues proceed from the Lord and, with His grace, come to us. But we must die to self first in order to possess them. He addresses the virtues as his "holy Ladies" whom he salutes with reverence and love: "Hail, Queen Wisdom; the Lord save you, with your holy sister pure Simplicity. Holy Lady Poverty, may the Lord save you, with your sister Holy Humility. Holy Lady Charity, the Lord save you, with your sister Holy Obedience. Whoever has one of you, and does not offend the rest, has all of you. And whoever offends against any one of you, has none and offends against you all." Above all, he praises wisdom which is so sacred, sublime and precious; which makes him love God with all his heart, mind and soul, and not to glory in anything but giving glory to God alone. He said: "Nobody ought to flatter himself with undue applause over anything that a sinner can do. A sinner can fast, pray, weep, mortify his flesh. But this he cannot do: remain loyal to his Lord."

Reflection: Our Secular Franciscan Rule is a lamp brightening our path along the way to holiness. Not only does it lead in the practice of virtues but also guides toward the functional development of the fraternity. The General Constitution of the SFO has established the guidelines for a better understanding of our active collaboration in the spiritual and functional aspect of the community. The good, unselfish disposition and enthusiasm of one member will reflect upon all the rest. The brothers and sisters are co-responsible for the life of the fraternity in all its facets, especially in the spiritual one. The fraternity is a full, healthy body, when all its members are committed and work together, following in the footsteps of Christ and St. Francis. "The sense of co-responsibility of the members requires personal presence, witness, prayer, and active collaboration." (General Constitution, Article 30.1). We are called to build together a community of love, with the gift of ourselves that truly makes it work. Faithfulness in fulfilling our profession commitment is considered a step toward holiness.

Feasts of the Month – Corpus Domini – June 14 – This feast is usually called: the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. Jesus, after the multiplication of loaves and fishes, fed a large crowd in anticipation of another type of food that he would still give them: His own Body and Blood. Seven times, in different passages of the Gospel, he repeated the important statement of being "the living bread that came from heaven." 1) "Amen, amen, I say to you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you do not have life within you." 2) Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood have eternal life and I will raise him up on the last day." 3) "For my flesh is true food and my blood is true drink." 4) "Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him." 5) "The one who feeds on me will have life because of me." 6) "This is the bread that came down from heaven." 7) "Whoever eats this bread will live forever."



Because of the feast and the loving attention given to it, reparation would be made for the irreverence and impiety shown to the Blessed Sacrament.

The Most Sacred Heart of Jesus – June 19 + The Immaculate Heart of Mary – June 20



The two feasts taken together are called "The Alliance of the Hearts of Jesus and Mary". There is an evident analogy between the Son and the Mother in terms of their being and their doing. Our late Pope John Paul II put it beautifully in his homily of 24 September 2000:

"Mary has a unique relationship with the second person of the Trinity, the Word made flesh, since she is directly involved in the mystery of the Incarnation. She is

Mother, and as such Christ honors and loves her. At the same time, she recognizes him as her God and Lord, making herself a disciple with an attentive and faithful heart (cf. Lk 2:19, 51) and his generous associate (Lumen Gentium, n. 61) in the work of Redemption. In the Incarnate Word and in Mary the infinite distance between the Creator and creature became a supreme closeness; they are the holy space for the mysterious nuptials of the divine nature with the human, the place where the Trinity is revealed for the first time and where Mary represents the new humanity, ready to take up again, in obedient love, the dialogue of the Covenant."
