#### **Our Lady of Guadalupe – December 12th**

A poor Indian named Juan Diego, a fifty-seven year old widower on his way to Mass one Saturday morning in December encountered beautiful music by a hill called Tepeyac. A radiant cloud appeared and within it a young Native American maiden dressed like an Aztec



princess. The lady sent Juan Diego to the Franciscan bishop of Mexico to request that a chapel be built on the hill where she appeared.

Eventually the bishop told Juan Diego to have the lady give him a sign. About the same time Juan Diego's uncle became seriously ill. This led poor Diego to try to avoid the lady. The lady found Juan Diego and assured him of a recovery for his uncle and provided roses for Juan to carry to the bishop in his cape.

When Juan Diego opened his cape in the bishop's presence, the roses fell to the ground and the bishop sank to his knees. On Juan Diego's cape was a beautiful painting of Mary as she appeared at the hill of Tepeyac. It was December 12, 1531.

# Feast of the Immaculate Conception – December 8th

A feast called the Conception of Mary arose in the Eastern Church in the seventh century. In the eighth century it came to the Western church and in the eleventh century it received its name, the Immaculate Conception.



In 1854 Pius IX gave the infallible statement: "The most Blessed Virgin Mary, in the first instant of her conception, by a singular grace and privilege granted by almighty God, in view of the merits of Jesus Christ, the savior of the human race, was preserved free from all stain of original sin."

Two Franciscans, William of Ware and Blessed Scotus, helped develop John Duns theology; point Mary's they out that Immaculate Conception enhances Jesus' redemptive work. This Feast is a Holy Day of Obligation and is observed on December 8th.

# A reading from the 'Later Admonitions and Exhortation, to the Brothers and Sisters of Penance', by Saint Francis.

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen. Brother Francis, their servant and subject, sends esteem and reverence, true peace from heaven and sincere love in the Lord to all Christian religious people; clergy and laity, men and women, and to all who live in the whole world.

Because I am the servant of all, I am obliged to serve all and to administer the fragrant words of my Lord to them. Therefore, realizing that I could not visit each one of you personally because of sickness and the weakness of my body, I decided to offer you in this letter and message the words of Our Lord Jesus Christ, who is the Word of the Father, and the words of the Holy Spirit, who are spirit and life.

The Most High Father made known from heaven through his holy angel Gabriel this word of the Father – so worthy, so holy and glorious – in the womb of the holy and glorious Virgin Mary, from whose womb he received the flesh of our humanity and frailty.
