The Information Corner

Mar 23th – Feast of St. Catherine of Genoa (1447-1510) ⁴

Going to confession one day was the turning point of Catherine's life.

When Catherine was born, many Italian nobles were supporting Renaissance artists and writers. The needs of the poor and the sick were often overshadowed by a hunger for luxury and self-indulgence.



Catherine's parents were members of the nobility in Genoa. At 13 she attempted to become a nun but failed because of her age. At 16 she married Julian, a nobleman who turned out to be selfish and unfaithful. For a while

she tried to numb her disappointment by a life of selfish pleasure.

One day in confession she had a new sense of her own sins and how much God loved her. She reformed her life and gave good example to Julian, who soon turned from his self-centered life of distraction.

Julian's spending, however, had ruined them financially. He and Catherine decided to live in the Pammatone, a large hospital in Genoa, and to dedicate themselves to works of charity there. After Julian's death in 1497, Catherine took over management of the hospital.

She wrote about purgatory which, she said, begins on earth for souls open to God. Life with God in heaven is a continuation and perfection of the life with God begun on earth.

Exhausted by her life of self-sacrifice, she died September 15, 1510, and was canonized in 1737.

Things turned out quite differently from what I expected. Despite all the local anesthesia and pain medicine the Emergency Department surgeons could give me, I felt everything they did to my back to cut open and treat the infection. As you can imagine, it was extremely painful. Only later did we discover that my blood pressure was 210 over 182 as a result of being in such pain for so long.



I really believe - in fact, I'm certain - that your prayers sustained me through all of this, by calling on Our Lord to strengthen and help me. It's very possible that I could have had a

stroke during that procedure, but praise God I didn't. Thank you, thank you so much for your prayers.

It is only with each other's prayers, along with the intercession of our Heavenly Mother Mary foremost, the prayers of our brothers and sisters in Heaven--the saints, and the powerful help and protection of the angels, especially our Guardian Angel, that we will be able to "navigate" (in the ship of Holy Mother Church) this world fraught with so many pitfalls.

I believe Saint Thomas More stated well the main benefit of intercessory prayer when he said, 'Pray for me, as I will for thee, that we may merrily meet in heaven." 

We must also fast and abstain from vices and sins and from an excess of food and drink and be Catholics.


