

ADMONITION OF ST. FRANCIS

16. On cleanliness of heart ¹

"Blessed (are) the clean of heart, since they themselves shall see God" (Mt 5:8). Truly are they clean in heart who despise earthly things, seek heavenly ones and do not ever withdraw from adoring and beholding Our Lord, living and true, with a clean heart and soul.

The Information Corner May 1st – Divine Mercy Sunday



The Feast of Divine Mercy is celebrated on the Sunday after Easter Sunday. The feast of Divine Mercy was revealed by Christ Himself to Saint Maria Faustina Kowalska and was extended to the entire Catholic Church by Pope John

Paul II on April 30, 2000, the day that he canonized Saint Faustina. A PLENARY INDULGENCE (the forgiveness of all temporal punishment resulting from sins that have already been confessed) is granted on the Feast of Divine Mercy to all the faithful, who:

Go to Confession, receive Holy Communion, pray for the intentions of the Holy Father, and "in any church or chapel, in a spirit that is completely detached from the affection for a sin, even a venial sin, take part in the



prayers and devotions held in honor of Divine Mercy, or who, in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament exposed or reserved in the tabernacle, recite the Our Father and the Creed, adding a devout prayer to the merciful Lord Jesus (e.g., 'Merciful Jesus, I trust in you!')."

I. The usual conditions for every plenary indulgence:

- sacramental confession [according to previously issued norms, within about 20 days before or after]
- Eucharistic communion [according to previously issued norms, preferably on the day, or the days before or after]
- prayer for the intentions of Supreme Pontiff [certain prayers are not specified]

II. The specific conditions added for this Indulgence on Divine Mercy Sunday are:

- in any church or chapel, in a spirit that is completely detached from the affection for a sin, even a venial sin, take part in the prayers and devotions held in honor of Divine Mercy
- or, in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament exposed or reserved in the tabernacle, recite the Our Father and the Creed, adding a devout prayer to the merciful Lord Jesus (e.g., "Merciful Jesus, I trust in you!")



The Rule

April Reflection

Lent is a time of forgiveness and mercy, not only for ourselves but also for others. If we want to be forgiven, we must also forgive. It is a requirement given to us by Jesus. In Matthew 18:21-22, it says, that Peter came to Jesus and asked, "Lord, how many times shall I forgive my brother when he sins against me? Up to seven times?" Jesus answered, "I tell you, not seven times, but seventy-seven times.

Forgiving our neighbor when we are offended is not easy. Christ's cross was one of compassion and mercy for the sinner. Our cross should also be one of love and forgiveness, compassion and mercy towards one another.

Below I have outlines eight steps to forgiveness. Ponder them often whenever the need arises to forgive! May God bless each one of you and hold you in the palm of his hand. Amen.

STEPS TO FORGIVENESS

- 1. Forgiveness is a decision, not a feeling. You don't have to feel it, to do it! It is an act of the will.
- 2. Pray for the grace to forgive. Think of Our Lady and how she forgave us for killing her Son in her worst agony at the foot of the cross. It was our sins that crucified Him!

- 3. In prayer, Jesus once told me; "Do not focus on the hurts others inflict upon you; focus on your reaction to them." Ask yourself: Was my reaction pleasing to God, or did it also offend Him? Remember, you will NOT be judged on other people's actions towards you, but on your reaction towards them. If the offense hurt you, it hurt God even more, because He is all good. Therefore, like St. Francis, be more concerned with the offense against God, than with the offense against yourself.
- 4. Ask the Holy Spirit to let the other person know, who hurt you, how you are feeling, and ask the Holy Spirit to convict them if they are wrong. Most often, people hurt us without intentionally meaning to do so.
- 5. Emotions and feelings are not sins. It's what we do with them that makes them a sin... Ask the Lord to help you to use your anger for the building up of the kingdom.
- 6. Pray for peaceful solutions to your own daily problems and for the problems in the world.
- 7. Pray for the other person and for the grace to do something nice for them by practicing the Beatitudes. It will heal YOU, and you will feel the resentment instantly melting away.
- 8. When we pray the Our Father, we are asking God to forgive us in the same manner that we forgive our enemies... Thus, it is a necessity to forgive others if we want to be forgiven.
