October Reflection: The Fruit of the Holy Spirit

As I was meditating on the third Glorious Mystery of the Holy Rosary, I started to think of the fruit of the Spirit and how it helps to have a physical analogy of a spiritual truth. I wondered if I was producing good fruit in all the different aspects of my life. I thought about work, family, friends, and society as a whole; how I want to produce good fruit and love others, but sometimes I fall short of the goal.

Jesus tells us in John chapter 15 how He is the vine and we are the branches, and that we must abide in Him to produce good fruit. So it all starts with a real relationship with God in prayer and letting Him know my desire to serve and honor Him with my life. With God is love! If I stay close to God in prayer with a pure desire to love Him and others I will be successful.



To do this, I have to be on guard all the time; this is where the Holy Spirit comes in. "The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control (*Gal 5:22-23*)." We can ask ourselves questions like: did I handle this situation with love and peace? Did I show self-control? Was I gentle and kind? We can use this beautiful verse to help us do a quick review of conscience.

Everything we do as Christians and Franciscans is predicated on our relationship with the triune God. We can't do it alone, and God the Father knows that. He sent His Son to redeem us and show us an example, and continually help us with the Holy Spirit and His transforming power. So by asking God to help us produce good fruit and plenty of it, He will do as long as we display our willingness for conversion, repentance, trust, and a desire to do His holy will in our lives.
