2. The Wickedness of Self Will²

The Lord said to Adam: From "every tree eat, however, from the tree of good and evil you may not eat" (cf. *Gen 2:16.17*). From every tree of paradise he could eat, because while he did not go against obedience, he did not sin. For one eats of the tree of the knowledge of good, who appropriates his own will to himself and exalts himself because of the good things, which the Lord says and works in him; and so through the suggestion of the devil and the transgression of the mandate it has become the fruit of the knowledge of evil. Chapter Three, Article 20 of The Rule of the Secular Franciscan Order.

The Information Corner

Jan 30th – Feastday of St. Hyacinth of Mariscotti.⁵

St. Hyacintha was born into a wealthy and prominent family in 1585. Her father was Count Antonio of Mariscotti, and her mother descended from princely the Roman family of the Orsini.



After her younger sister had been given in marriage, the disappointed Clarice, as Hyacintha was then called, entered the convent of the Tertiaries at Viterbo as a secular Tertiary. She permitted herself to be given all sorts of things by way of eatables and articles of dress which enabled her to enjoy quite an agreeable and comfortable existence. Her rooms were furnished with much worldly apparatus.

The spirit of mortification and of penance which every Tertiary should practice was not discernible to Hyacintha at this point in her life.

When she was afflicted with a strange illness, her confessor was obliged to go to her rooms to administer the sacraments to her. When he saw the worldly and frivolous objects in her cell, he sharply reproved the sick sister.

Following her confessor's advice, she went to the common refectory and there, with a rope around her neck, begged forgiveness of her fellow sisters for her behavior.

Only after she had invoked the aid of St. Catherine of Siena, however, did she dispossess herself of all frivolous and unnecessary objects, and entered upon a life of heroic virtue.

She then led a very penitential life, persevering unto the end. She went barefoot, wore an old habit that had been discarded by another sister, and performed the lowliest and most trying tasks. She ate only inferior food with which she mixed bitter herbs. Her bed consisted of a few bare boards, with but a single blanket, and a stone for her pillow. She fostered a special devotion to the sufferings of Christ; and in memory of them, subjected herself to special austerities on Fridays and in Holy Week. She also entertained a filial love for Mary, the Mother of Mercy, who sometimes appeared to her and comforted her.

St. Hyacintha de Mariscotti died at the age of 55, in 1640. Many miracles occurred at her grave for which reason Pope Benedict XIII placed her in the ranks of the blessed. In 1807 she was canonized by Pope Pius VII.

Joseph: Saint, Illustrious Son of David



On December 8, 2020, Pope Francis proclaimed the "Year of St. Joseph", to run through Dec 8, 2021. This marks the 150th anniversary of St. Joseph being named Patron of the Universal

Church. The Church has given 22 titles to St. Joseph. I thought a good way to honor him this year would be to reflect on these titles.

The first title is one we may not often consider to be a title as such, even though we always say it: "Saint". He is in the presence of the Lord in all His glory, is able to look upon our Lord and Savior, together with all the other saints. That to which we are all called has been given him.

"Illustrious Son of David" is another title, which recognizes St. Joseph as a descendent of King David. In Matthew ch. 1, three groups of 14 generations ending with Joseph are named. So St. Joseph is an essential part of the fulfillment of the prophecy that the Messiah would come from David's line.
