Admonitions of Saint Francis – 3. Perfect Obedience

The Lord says in the Gospel: Whoever does not renounce all that he possesses, cannot be my disciple (Lk 14:33); Whoever wishes to save his soul must lose it (Lk 9:24). That person who offers himself totally to obedience in the hands of his prelate leaves all that he possesses and loses his body. And whatever he does and says which he knows is not contrary to his will is true obedience, provided that what he does is good. And should a subject see that some things might be better and more useful for his soul than what a prelate commands, let him willingly offer such things to God as a sacrifice; and, instead, let him earnestly strive to fulfill the prelate's wishes.



The Rule – Chapter III, Article 24, of the Rule states:

24. To foster communion among members, the council should organize regular and frequent meetings of the community as well as meeting with other Franciscan groups, especially with youth groups. It should adopt appropriate means for growth in Franciscan and ecclesial life and encourage everyone to

a life of fraternity. This communion continues with deceased brothers and sisters through prayer for them.

Pope Quote – "During the month of May, let us lift our eyes toward the Mother of God, our consolation and sure hope, and let us pray together the Rosary to face the trials of this moment together and to be ever more united as a spiritual family."

Papal Intention for the Month – **The World of Finance** -That those in charge of finance will work with governments to regulate the financial sphere and protect citizens from its dangers.

Fraternity Finances – Last month we received \$215 in donations and disbursed \$1,113 in expenses (expenses included \$1020 for Fair Share contribution to the Region).

<u>Important– Early Elections</u> – To reduce the period of time the fraternity might be without a full council, your Council has decided to move the fraternity elections forward to **Saturday**, **June 26**, at 11:00am; plan to arrive at 10:30. Please reserve this date on your calendar.

Elections must be held in person, so we have reserved our regular meeting room, the St. Bonaventure Room, at the Monastery. By that time restrictions on gatherings should be low enough to allow us to meet. Please make plans to attend the elections. This is one of your obligations as a member of the fraternity and the Order. Even if you have been excused from meeting attendance, if you can attend, please do so anyway.

Our fraternity must have a quorum of one-half plus one of our professed, active members, which as of this writing would be 13. If a quorum is not present, the fraternity would have to be **deactivated** due to a lack of Council.

<u>Survey Results</u> – Here are the results of the fraternity survey Council initiated. There were 18 responses, only 11 were from active members. We sent the survey to 89 members, of which 28 are active. So 20% of all members responded, and 39% of active members responded.

- Monthly meeting: 13 wanted it to continue, 5 did not, so monthly meetings will continue.
- Chimes: 10 wanted the full Chimes, 4 want a simpler version, and 4 want email only, but only one fraternity member volunteered to compose it. See article on our new editor.
- Web site: 15 want it to continue, 2 did not. Only one non-Council member volunteered to help maintain the web site.
- Serve on Council: 3 professed members said yes to some Council position for the next elections, and since then one has withdrawn, leaving only two willing to serve.

<u>Fraternity's Future</u> – As of this writing, with the surveys returned and counted and some additional conversations, we have only four professed members willing to serve on Council.

If we cannot elect a full Council at the elections, the next step will be to **deactivate** the fraternity. Those members who wish to transfer to another fraternity will have to submit transfer requests, which would be individually processed.

<u>Thank you, Vilma</u> – Due to health reasons, Vilma has resigned as Treasurer of the fraternity. Council thanks her for her service to our fraternity, a true servant leader. Please extend to her your gratitude as well and pray that her health improves.

May Reflection

Prudence, called the "charioteer of virtues" because it keeps all the cardinal virtues in moderation, is a present in all the saints. It was certainly known to St. Joseph, who had to have practiced it as a father and provider: When to praise, to admonish, to teach, and to just have fun. He especially exemplified it in how he acted to protect his loved ones from harm by taking them to Egypt, how to shelter and provide for them, and when to return with them Nazareth.

St. Joseph was also courageous in many ways, the escape to Egypt being already being mentioned being the most obvious. Another is by going through with his marriage to Mary, trusting in the Lord. It also takes great courage to take on the responsibility of raising a son God Himself has entrusted to your care. Jesus showed great courage and fortitude in facing His trials and passion, virtues, He saw lived out in the realm of human existence by His earthly father Joseph.

Election Reflection

"Now that I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you should also wash one another's feet." (Jn 13:14) "If anyone wants to be first, he shall be last of all and servant of all. (Mk 9:35) "The King of the Gentiles lord it over them and those who have authority over them are called 'Benefactors.' But it not this way with you, but the one who is greatest among you must become like the youngest and the leader like the servant. (Lk 22:25-26)

Servant leadership is what is called for in each of these: how to serve while leading, and how to lead by serving. Jesus showed us this different kind of leadership, one where the needs, wants, desires, hopes, and welfare of others come before one's own.

Professed Secular Franciscans know this, having learned it during our period of formation. It is good to remind ourselves of it, however, especially when it is time to elect a new Council, and to decide how to serve one another in our fraternal community.

Responses such as, "I can't do that, "I'm not ready", or "I'm not worthy" fall short. Who is truly able, ready, or worthy? Was Peter? The Lord called him to walk on the water, and while he trusted in Jesus, he was able to do so. Jesus sent forth his disciples to heal the sick and proclaim the good news, and they went out, unprepared for their journey, yet found shelter and nourishment where they went, and performed miracles in His name. They rejoiced, for they believed, and the Lord gave them what was needed. You, too will be given the grace to serve, if you only say, "yes."
